From the Desk of the President

Presidents Message

Compatriots,

As my term of office comes to a close, I would like to reflect on several accomplishments achieved over the past two years.

Membership in the Nebraska Society has reached a historic high. A new chapter has been established in North Platte, a Ladies Auxiliary has been chartered, and Liberty Trees have been dedicated in numerous communities across the state. These achievements were the result of the efforts of many dedicated individuals, and the credit rightly belongs to them.



The coming year promises to be a busy one, with numerous America 250 events offering opportunities for meaningful participation. The color guard has a full slate of potential events, and we are now receiving program requests from individuals and organizations who are seeking us out, rather than the color guard initiating contact. While not every request can be fulfilled—working every weekend would place an unreasonable burden on our members—public visibility remains a key driver of membership growth, and active involvement is essential to retention.

Member retention is not a new challenge. Even General George Washington faced similar difficulties, as many soldiers' enlistments expired on December 31. On December 19, 1777, the Continental Army entered winter encampment at Valley Forge. With few buildings available, the troops constructed huts from local timber and devoted themselves to intensive training. When the camp broke six months later, the army had been transformed into a disciplined and effective fighting force.

The Nebraska Society faces a comparable challenge today: engaging new compatriots while avoiding burnout. Success depends on thoughtful planning, effective execution, and the delegation of responsibilities. These elements enable sustainable participation and long-term success.

By remembering the past and applying its lessons, we are better equipped to fulfill our mission of education, community service, and historic preservation.

Revolutionary History—America 250



The Battle of Great Bridge, VA—Dec 9, 1775



On December 8, 1775, Lord Dunmore sent Captain Samuel Leslie, and a contingent of Redcoats from Norfolk to Fort Murray, west of Great Bridge. They arrived on the morning of December 9, and made preparations to attack the Americans, who were camped at Great Bridge. As the British forces advanced over the bridge, the Americans pushed them back. Colonel Woodford led the American troops over the bridge and eventually pushed them back to Fort Murray. The British left the next day and retreated back to Norfolk.

This article appeared in the *Pennsylvania Evening Post*, on Jan 6, 1776, about the battle:

“This morning, after reveille beating, two or three great guns and some muskets were discharged from the enemy’s fort near Great Bridge, which, as it was not an unusual thing, was little regarded by Colonel Woodford. However, soon after, he heard a call to the soldiers to stand to their arms; upon which, with all expedition, he made the proper disposition to receive the enemy.

In the meantime, the enemy had crossed the bridge, fired the remaining houses on the island, and some large piles of shingles, and attacked our guard in the breastwork. Our men returned the fire and threw them into some confusion, but they were instantly rallied by Captain Fordyce, and advanced along the causeway with great resolution, keeping up a constant and heavy fire as they approached.

Two field-pieces, which had been brought across the bridge and planted on the edge of the island, facing the left of our breastwork, played briskly at the same time upon us. Lieut. Travis, who commanded in the breastwork, ordered his men to reserve their fire till the enemy came within the distance of fifty yards, and then they gave it to them with terrible execution.

The brave Fordyce exerted himself to keep up their spirits, reminded them of their ancient glory, and, waving his hat over his head, encouragingly told them the day was their own. Thus pressing forward, he fell within fifteen steps of the breastwork. His wounds were many, and his death would have been that of a hero, had he met it in a better cause.

The progress of the enemy was now at an end; they retreated over the causeway with precipitation, and were dreadfully galled in the rear. Hitherto, on our side, only the guard, consisting of twenty-five, and some others, upon the whole not amounting to more than ninety, had been engaged.

Only the regulars of the 14th Regiment, in number one hundred and twenty, had advanced upon the causeway, and about two hundred and thirty Tories and negroes had, after crossing the bridge, continued upon the island. The regulars, after retreating along the causeway, were again rallied by Captain Leslie, and the two field-pieces continued to play upon our men.

It was at this time that Colonel Woodford was advancing down the street to the breastwork with the main body, and against him was now directed the whole fire of the enemy. Never were cannon better served; but yet, in the face of them and the musketry which kept up a continual blaze, our men marched on with the utmost intrepidity.

Colonel Stevens, of the Culpeper battalion, was sent around to the left to flank the enemy, which was done with such activity and spirit that a rout immediately ensued. The enemy fled into their fort, leaving behind them the two field-pieces, which, however, they took care to spike up with nails. Many were killed and wounded in the flight, but Colonel Woodford very prudently restrained his troops from urging their pursuit too far.

From the beginning of the attack till the repulse from the breastwork might be about fourteen or fifteen minutes; till the total defeat, upwards of half an hour.


It is said that some of the enemy preferred death to captivity, from a fear of being scalped, which Lord Dunmore inhumanly told them would be their fate should they be taken alive. Thirty-one killed and wounded fell into our hands, and the number borne off was much greater.

Through the whole of the engagement, every officer and soldier behaved with the greatest courage and calmness. The conduct of our sentinels we cannot pass over in silence. Before they quitted their stations, they fired at least three rounds as the enemy were crossing the bridge, and one of them, who was posted behind some shingles, kept his ground till he had fired eight times; and after receiving a whole platoon, made his escape over the causeway into our breastwork.

The scene was closed with as much humanity as it had been conducted with bravery. The work of death being over, everyone's attention was directed to the succor of the unhappy sufferers, and it is an undoubted fact that Captain Leslie was so affected with the tenderness of our troops towards those who were yet capable of assistance, that he gave signs from the fort of his thankfulness for it.

What is not to be paralleled in history, and will scarcely appear credible, except to such as acknowledge a Providence over human affairs, this victory was gained at the expense of no more than a slight wound in a soldier's hand; and one circumstance which renders it still more amazing is, that the field-pieces raked the whole length of the street, and absolutely threw double-headed shot as far as the church; and afterwards, as our troops approached, cannonaded them heavily with grape-shot."

Compatriot Grave Marking—LeRoyce “Whitey” White

On Saturday, Oct 13, the Platte River Chapter hosted a Compatriot Grave Marking for North Platte Compatriot LeRoyce “Whitey” White.

Compatriot White’s biography from the ceremony:

“LeRoyce “Whitey” White was born July 31st, 1927 at North Platte to Leon Alfred and Pearl Louisa White. Whitey grew up on a farm in North Platte and later helped his mother operate a hotel on Front Street. He was playing a guitar in the hotel lobby at age 15 when a traveling musician asked him to fill in for a guitarist that night with the Gene Autry Band. In his junior year of high school he moved to Winslow, Arizona, before moving to San Diego and receiving his GED.

In 1945 Whitey returned to North Platte and married Laura Jean Coville. The couple had four children from 1948 to 1957. He worked for the railroad and then they moved to Los Angeles. Whitey worked for different bands and country singers. In 1965 Whitey formed his own country band. In 1970 they returned to North Platte where he and his brother formed their own country music group. In 1972 he became the manager of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Club where he formed a four piece house band. In 1981 his wife Jean died.

Whitey met Bette Anne Wolfe and they formed a country music duo called “The Country Smiles” They married in 1983. With wit, talent and energy Whitey played guitar and sang for nearly 50 years throughout the western states. In recognition of his accomplishments, Whitey was inducted into the Nebraska Country Music Hall of Fame. Whitey was the founder and owner-operator of North Platte’s Roundup advertising paper. Whitey was a member of St. Patrick’s Church, The Eagles, Nebraska Country Music Association, Nebraska Country Music Hall of Fame and The Sons of the American Revolution.”

LeRoyce White (#156492, NE #1081) was approved for membership into the Nebraska Society, Sons of the American Revolution on September 7, 2001, by being descended from Patriot Isham Bobbitt, who was a Sergeant in the North Carolina Militia. Compatriot White passed away March 23, 2007.
